TIPS FOR CHOOSING GRADE 11 COURSES

CONSIDERATIONS when selecting your 8 Grade 11 "senior" courses:

*3 COMPULSORY Courses - English, Mathematics and Religion:

- 1. <u>PLAN</u> Continue with "myBlueprint" to update your <u>Individual Pathways/Education Plan</u> (IPP) required of all Ontario students in grades 7-12 to review and update their plan twice yearly. www.myblueprint.ca/dpcdsb Access your profile from anywhere and explore with your parents. Visually plan and track your high school courses and identify postsecondary opportunities and entry pre-requisites. You can also complete interest and learning styles inventories (Assessments), set and track SMART Goals, research information on various Occupations and compare Post Secondary programs in Ontario and even across Canada. Pathways planning is also reviewed in gr. 10 "Career Studies".
- 2. <u>REVIEW</u> past and current courses, the "levels" and your achievement. Based on this, your possible post-secondary destination (college/ university/workplace) and specific program entry prerequisites, be sure to choose accordingly. There are <u>five pathway levels</u> for courses in the Senior grades: College (C), University and College (M), Open (O), University (U), Workplace (E).
- 3. CHECK that ALL diploma requirements-courses, literacy and community service are planned.
- 4. <u>CONSULT</u> with past and current subject teachers about the various courses or levels to take. If needed, make an appointment with your Guidance Counsellor. Be prepared with your research to have a discussion of your educational plan, and possible future destinations.
- ** In general, post-secondary "Diploma" programs require ENG 4C and "Degree" programs need ENG 4U plus 5 additional 4U/4M courses.

*5 ELECTIVE Courses:

- 1. The Ministry of Education and Training approved Iona for 2 Specialist High Skills Majors ("SHSM") in Arts and Culture (8 credit bundle), and Business-Marketing (9 credit bundle). Students who complete the requirements for the OSSD (Ontario Secondary School Diploma) and the SHSM will receive an OSSD with the SHSM red seal. The credits, including a 2 credit Co-operative Education experience, are earned at the Grade 11 and 12 level. For more information, see the website, or speak with an Arts/Business teacher or the Guidance Team.
- 2. <u>Co-operative Education</u> is an opportunity to gain valuable work experience while earning 2-4 credits. A separate application must be included during course registration/collection.
- 3. <u>Dual credit</u> opportunities allow senior students to attend college weekly as part of a special program to earn a high school <u>and</u> college credit simultaneously. See SST or board website.
- 4. <u>Day eLearning</u> / online courses are available as an optional delivery method for a day course.
- 5. All other <u>electives</u> should be based on exploring different disciplines, balanced with what is required for your planned post-secondary destination. Check program requirements for workplace or apprenticeship programs, and check <u>EACH</u> College or University you are considering → since requirements often differ. Create a folder of possible destinations and requirements. Visit campus Open Houses.
